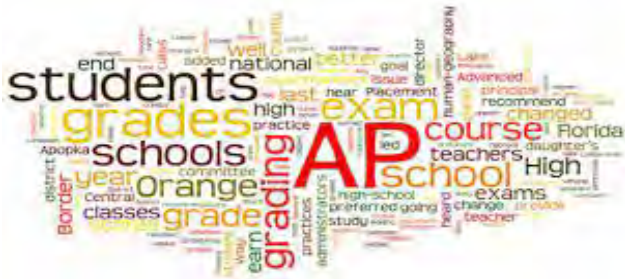

### Burnaby South History 1940s to the 1960s

With the outbreak of war in 1939, the nature of many of Burnaby South's extracurricular

activities changed. The

introduction of Cadets (air, army, navy) and girls Red Cross clubs, War Savings Stamps, and salvaging scrap were all destined to help the national war effort. The school name was to change to Winston Churchill, but that was denied. It was named Hugh M. Fraser (Commissioner to Burnaby when Burnaby went bankrupt in 1932) for three years during WWII. After the war, the name reverted, thankfully, to Burnaby South.

The post-war years brought more expansion and success to our school. The girls senior grass hockey and senior girl's basketball teams won consecutive titles. Each year, our school performed an operetta (Mikado, HMS Pinafore, The Forest Prince, The Chimes of Normandy). There were many activities such as mixers, hikes, hamper drives, father and son nights, vocational conferences, and public speaking, etc. In 1948, three hard surface tennis courts were dedicated to the memory of the fifty-one former students who paid the supreme sacrifice during WWII. In 1953, the senior boys' basketball team won the provincial championship, and the senior girls took second place. Our track and field team won the Inter-High Track Meet. Also, that year, our school was visited by the Prime Minister of Canada, Louis St. Laurent.

In 1954, a new wing of eight rooms was added, and the gymnasium enlarged. In 1956, a cafeteria, six rooms, and a second gymnasium were constructed, and the main building was renovated with a centralized main office. These additions barely kept up with the increased post-war increased enrollment. In June 1960, our first principal passed away just a few days after he had presented the graduation certificates.

#### 1958 Pep Club



Burnaby South held grade thirteen classes from 1958 to 1961, offering first-year university courses for a lower fee than at university. In 1960, these courses cost only \$125 compared to the \$325 fee charged to attend UBC.

In 1962, Ms. Hester Draper retired after over thirty years of teaching at our school. In 1965, Mr. J.H. Flemming, Vice Principal since 1930, retired. And in 1966, Mr. N.D. MacDonald, who was principal at Burnaby South for thirty years (1936 – 1966), retired. In 1966, the school's forty-fourth year had an enrollment of 1260 students with a staff of 52 teachers. In 1967, another new wing was added to house vocational courses along with a new cafeteria. Also, in 1967, the school band won a competition and was awarded a trip to Montreal for Expo '67.

Fever (above 38°C)	<b>If yes to 1 or more of these symptoms:</b> Stay home. Contact a health care provider or call 8-1-1 about your symptoms and next steps.

Difficulty breathing	
Loss of sense of smell or taste	
OTHER SYMPTOMS	WHAT TO DO
Sore throat	<b>If yes to 1 symptom:</b> Stay home until you feel better.
Loss of appetite	
Headache	<b>If yes to 2 or more of these symptoms:</b> Stay home for 24 hours. If symptoms don't get better or get worse, contact a health care provider or call 8-1-1 about your symptoms and next steps.
Body aches	
Extreme fatigue or tiredness	
Nausea or vomiting

INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL:	WHAT TO DO
Have you returned from travel outside Canada in the last 14 days?	<b>If yes:</b> Fully vaccinated students, staff and other adults who have travelled outside of Canada may qualify for the <a href="#">fully vaccinated traveller exemption</a> .  Students, staff and other adults who are not <a href="#">fully vaccinated</a> and have travelled outside of Canada <b>CANNOT attend school for 14 days after arrival</b> , as part of <a href="#">federal requirements</a> .
CLOSE CONTACT	WHAT TO DO
Have you been notified by public health that you are a close contact of a person confirmed to have COVID-19?	<b>If yes:</b> Follow the instructions provided by Public Health.

You can also check your symptoms with the [K-12 Health Check](#) or the [BC Self-Assessment Tool](#).

Call 8-1-1 with any questions about symptoms of illness. If you have severe symptoms, like difficulty breathing (struggling to breathe or you can only speak single words) or chest pain, call 9-1-1 or go to the nearest Emergency Department.
